TIME FOR THE ANCIENT STORY

Read silently or aloud – let these ancient words tap into your imagination.

After these events, the LORD's word came to Abram in a vision, "Don't be afraid, Abram. I am your protector. Your reward will be very great."

But Abram said, "LORD God, what can you possibly give me, since I still have no children? The head of my household is Eliezer, a man from Damascus." He continued, "Since you haven't given me any children, the head of my household will be my heir."

The LORD's word came immediately to him, "This man will not be your heir. Your heir will definitely be your very own biological child." Then he brought Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars if you think you can count them." He continued, "This is how many children you will have." Abram trusted the LORD, and the LORD recognized Abram's high moral character.

SO WHAT NOW?

Read silently or aloud – some thoughts on this story

I teach math at a high school. I teach Algebra 1 to 9th graders mostly. Just a few weeks before school was to start as a hybrid plan to protect everyone from COVID, the state's infection numbers spiked bad and we learned that school would open 100% online.

My students were to have transitioned to high school with all the “stuff” that their freshman year sets up – all the assemblies, football games, volleyball matches, getting used to being more grown up, the dances, the spirit weeks – you get the picture.

And now? Now my students come to class behind a letter in a Google Meet.

We do the best we can – with internet outages and software crashes and systems not cooperating with each other – all while trying to learn and communicate and build relationships and turn in and grade assignments. This school year is not cool and it isn't our fault. It isn't our fault that COVID appeared. It isn't our fault that COVID is a nasty nasty virus. It isn't our fault that decisions are made that make our lives incredibly difficult.

Same thing happened to Abram back in the day.

Today we are jumping a huge jump – from the first humans realizing the huge decision they made to eat the fruit of the tree God told them not to, all the way to years later where we see Abram and Sarai and Lot and a bunch of kings get into a hot mess.

There was a famine, and there were some painful family break ups (Abram and Lot), and there were some awesome blessings as Abram gained a lot of material wealth but apparently didn't get a big head with it. And if Abram complained, it isn't written here.

Then right before our story, a bunch of kings get into a fight and took Lot and all that Lot had. That's what kings in fights did back then – and still do today in some parts of the world. So Abram finds out, and takes off to rescue Lot. He does, and the kings stop fighting – not really at peace but at least not fighting – and it seems all is well.

Not fun.

Then God shows up in a vision – that's our story today. God shows up and tells Abram not to fear because God is Abram's protector.

And Abram cries out to God – but I don't have a son! Without a son to leave all my stuff to, what am I supposed to do? My stuff has to go to my biological son!

Let me stop for a sec. See, in Abram's culture and timeframe – way back thousands of years ago and in the Middle East – that was THE thing for a guy. You built up your wealth, your farm, your whatever and you gave it to your first-born son. That was the tradition. That was the way. It seemed every guy did it because that's the way it had always been.

And Abram is getting older and Sarai has not had any children, for whatever reason. We don't get to hear from Sarai on how she feels about the whole thing – because back then your worth as a woman was wrapped up in having that firstborn son for your husband.

And people didn't live forever back then ...

So Abram cries out. And God stops him and challenges Abram. "Count the stars, if you can ... that's how many kiddos and grandkids and great grandkids you're going to have. Your biological son will inherit everything you have."

Whoa. I can imagine God chuckling ... Count the stars ... if you can. Because that's how many descendants ... It's not like if Abram counted 1276 stars that night that God would make Abram have 1276 descendants – it's more of an idea that Abram can't count them all!

But God! You know Sarai hasn't been able to get pregnant! You know we are getting older, almost past the age of having kids! You know this is a terrible harsh world filled with war and kings who take people and not enough to eat with famines and ... God! Are you for reals?

The story doesn't reveal whether Abram thought these things. I bet he did. And I bet Sarai did too. What kind of God makes promises like that? So off the chart amazing that they can't possibly be true?

The same God that said – do not fear.

So ... maybe after a time, we don't really know ... Abram trusts God. And God knows that Abram is honestly trusting ... so it's all good.

But ... we aren't promised a biological son to meet a culture's expectation. What *are* we promised?

In the Psalms and in other places in the Hebrew Scriptures (the first part of the Bible) and especially in the Gospels, God makes it clear what we are promised – presence. Grace. Mercy. Protection. Love.

We are promised that no matter what happens with COVID – God is with us.

We are promised that no matter what happens in our families – God gives us grace.

We are promised that no matter how hard online or hybrid school may be – God gives us mercy.

We are promised that no matter how hard our day to day lives might be – God gives us protection.

And above all – no matter what – we are promised that God gives us love.

My question for you is – will we trust? *Really* trust these promises? Because they might not turn out the way *we* want them to. God doesn't always work in ways we expect and God certainly doesn't take orders from us. Will we trust that God will keep these promises even if we think it isn't happening?

God is still with us even if we honestly say no – we can't trust. Because life has been too painful, too hard, too awful. God gets it. And God is still here. So – even if we can't trust, God keeps those promises. For real. Whether we trust or not. And that's pretty awesome, if you ask me.

Pray as you are comfortable – read silently, say out loud, whisper.

Let your voice speak loud and clear, O God
May Your visions comfort our weary eyes

As You once came to Abram despite his doubt
Come to us in our uncertain future too

Point us toward the twinkling night lights above
Hold our tear-stained faces and shattered hearts

As You once gave Abram words of courage
Remind us of Your safety that we may not fear

Guide us from traditions and false promises
Defend us as we learn to defiantly trust You

What other parts of creation are like the stars?

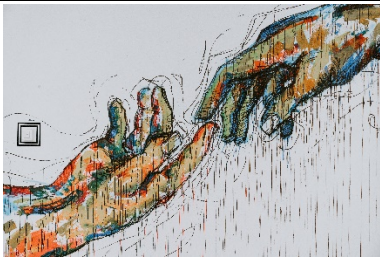


FAMILY
